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Contextualisation

The subject English Language II provides students with a basic and instrumental knowledge of the English language. The course is mainly practical with an emphasis on the usage of the English language. The basic communicative strategies of the English language will be reviewed with an emphasis on the morphosyntax of the English language, the lexical aspects and the reading, writing, listening and speaking skills. Part of the work done in the areas of reading, writing, listening and speaking aims at reviewing students' prior knowledge of English and reinforcing initial fluency. The level of competence to be achieved by the students as regards the four skills will be Upper-intermediate, level B2. The contents of this subject are aligned with the levels described by the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. English Language I embodies and reflects the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. English Language II is included within the Linguistic Competence module of the English Studies degree. The subject English Language II and English Language III, IV, V, VI, VII and VIII complement each other to provide students with an instrumental knowledge of the English language through the degree. The subject English Language II provides the basic tools to help students become accurate users of the English language, which will enable them to participate in English speaking professional contexts.

Theme content

1.. GRAMMAR

The passive voice, verb patterns- Have something done, ungradable adjectives, position of adverbs, relative clauses, reduced relative clauses, reported speech, reporting verbs, conditionals

vocabulary: vocabulary practice through semantic fields, Idioms, prefixes, word combination, common adverb/adjective collocations, guessing meaning from context.

2.. READING

Reading strategies, skimming and scanning, summarising, interpreting cohesive devices.

Top-down and bottom-up approaches to reading.

3.. WRITING

Process writing. Effective sentence structures. Writing conventions. Gender and language. Avoiding repetition in sentences. Grouping and classifying points. Opinion texts. Reports and reviews.

4.. LISTENING

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Phonetics Listening strategies. Identification of key ideas. Knowledge of sounds. Development of productive and receptive skills.

Teaching methodology

All parts (Grammar and Vocabulary, Writing, Reading, Listening and Speaking)must be passed with a 5 to get a pass in the subject.

All parts will count 20% towards the final mark. All parts are recoverable in July.
