Contextualisation

English Language III is taught in the first semester of the second year of the English Studies degree and intends to continue the enhancement of students' skills in English initiated in the first year with English Language I and II. The course is included within the Linguistic Competence Module of the aforementioned degree and is followed by English Language IV in the second semester of the same year and four more related courses in subsequent years, all of which are intended to provide students with an instrumental knowledge of English.

The scope of the course is mainly practical, although attention will be paid to specific theoretical issues which are relevant to the learning of a language, such as morphology, syntax or word formation. Thus, it covers the four skills (reading, writing, listening and speaking) and intends to consolidate the students' previous knowledge of English as well as enhance their communicative abilities fostering greater fluency and accuracy in their use of the language.

This Teaching Guide has been elaborated following the descriptions offered by the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages of the skills to be acquired by a learner of English at level C1.

Requirements

There are no official requirements for this course.



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Recommendable

Although there are no prerequisites, it is highly recommended for students to have passed *English Language I* and *II* of the English Studies degree or at least to have a good knowledge of English at level B2, as described by the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

Skills

Specific

- * Capacity to communicate in English in both oral and written forms with the fluency, accuracy and complexity appropriate to each context and situation.
- * Capacity to locate and handle information related to the discipline from databases and Internet sources, as well as to use computer applications on specific field-related issues.

Content

The course contents are divided into several sections which are related to the different skills to be acquired.

Theme content

1. LANGUAGE STUDY

The continuous aspect, the perfect aspect, articles, modal verbs, subordinate clauses, modal perfect, cohesion (linkers), future forms with *to be*, future in the past, emphatic structures (inversion), the passive, and causatives

2. WRITING

Sentence and paragraph construction. Using connectors and cohesive devices. Punctuation. Building arguments and organising information. Types of texts: register, tone, purpose and style.

Specific writing practice: A covering letter, a problem solution essay, a speech, describing visual information, summarising, anda sales leaflet.

3. READING

Strategies for reading: skimming and scanning. Interpreting cohesive devices. Predicting and comparing. Understanding meaning from context. Identifying tone, purpose and style.

4. VOCABULARY

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Vocabulary practice through semantic fields. Paraphrasing and guessing meaning from context. Synonyms, homonyms and false friends. Collocations, idioms and phrasal verbs. Word formation: suffixes, prefixes and compounds.

5. LISTENING

Listening for gist and detail. Identifying speakers and context. Guessing meaning from context. Note-taking while listening. Interpreting attitudes: intonation.

6. SPEAKING

Managing interaction in different contexts. Coping with vocabulary problems: paraphrasing. Describing objects and actions. Expressing views and reaching agreement. Giving presentations in academic contexts. Using question tags.

Teaching methodology

Students should be aware that in order to attain the C1 (CEFR) level by the end of English IV they need to attend class regularly and spend time perfecting those areas of English in which they may have problems. Class attendance is therefore an important part of the learning process. If any student is unable to attend class then they should contact the course tutors. Please note that the continuous assessment exam is compulsory for all students. If a student does not turn up for the continuous assessment exam then they will not be able to resit this section (worth 20%) and will therefore lose 20% of their overall grade. The time devoted to the course will be organised in the following way:

At the beginning of the semester a schedule of the subject will be made available to students through the UIBdigital platform. Specific risks and protective measures

The learning activities of this course do not entail specific health or safety risks for the students and therefore no special protective measures are needed.

Student learning assessment

Students will be assessed on five different sections, each of them with a value of 20% of the final grade: Use of English, Reading, Listening, Writing and Speaking. **ALL OF THEM MUST BE PASSED WITH A 5** for the student to get a pass in the course. If a student passes the course numerically (over 50%) but has failed one of the sections, they will be given a 4.5 as their final mark. The evaluation process is divided into 3 areas: a continuous assessment/progress test (20%), a final exam (60%) and an oral presentation (20%). Students will be told the date of the continuous assessment on the first day of class. The oral presentations will take place in the last week(s)of class.

Please bear in mind the following:

The dates and times of the official exams will not be altered under any circumstances, except those contemplated by the Reglament Acadèmic (when two exams coincide on the same day with a time difference of under three hours between them). Students will not be allowed into the classroom when the exam/test/practical session has already started.

Assessment criteria Mastery of English (accuracy and complexity) regarding the following skills: reading, writing, use of English,

listening and speaking. Students will work from the course book Language Leader Advanced, units 1-6.

There will be a continuous assessment exam worth 20% of the overall mark after unit 3 or 4 of the course book. The date will be confirmed by the the tutor at the beginning of the course. The continuous assessment

will be as follows:

Use of English 5%

Listening 5%

Reading 5%

Writing 5%

Final grade percentage: 20%

Speaking and Listening

Description Students will have a two hour class every other week. They will have the opportunity to do a variety of

speaking and listening exercises in a smaller group.

Assessment criteria Students will give an individual presentation during the last week of the course. Time slots will be given in

class by the tutor.

In the JULY exam, the presentation will be replaced with an interview format oral test.

Final grade percentage: 20%

Writing). This exam can be retaken in JULY, where it will be worth 80% of the final mark.
