Contextualisation

This course offers a general introduction to gender studies in the English-speaking world. It reflects on the impact of social forces on the construction of gender and the perpetuation of gender inequalities in various periods and contexts. It focuses on the ways in which these constructions have been questioned and revised by feminist movements and critical frameworks from diverse Anglophone contexts.

Requirements

Essential requirements

All students must be able to use English at a C1 level, both orally and in written form. The frame of reference is "English Language IV and V" as taught at the UIB.

Recommendable

IMPORTANT: This is a course designed for students of the humanities with background knowledge of the English-speaking world and who are already familiar with the methodological tools required for the literary and cultural analysis of texts. This background will be essential to follow the contents and methodology of the course, hence students from other disciplines are advised against taking this course.

Teaching methodology

Classes are NOT compulsory although attendance is recommended considering the practical character of the sessions. Some of the assessment activities that will be part of the students' portfolio will be explained in class, therefore students who do not attend these sessions are responsible for obtaining the relevant information and instructions for the completion of those specific activities.

Mobile phones and other electronic devices are NOT allowed in the classroom. Laptop computers are acceptable ONLY if used for purposes related to classroom activity. No electronic device whatsoever (including computers) is allowed in the classroom during exams/practical sessions, unless otherwise specified by the lecturer (e.g., if the practical session entails use of the internet for pedagogical purposes). Any student found using these devices for purposes unrelated to the course will be asked to leave the room.

Late arrivals are NOT welcome. Students should not enter the classroom once the session has started and will be asked to wait until the break to join the group.

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Students are reminded of the importance of checking Campus Extens regularly for important announcements concerning the subject. Any announcement made through Campus Extens has the same validity as those included in this programme. The material included in Campus Extens will be considered part of the exam. Exam dates and other relevant information about exams or portfolio will be notified through Campus Extens as well as in the class schedule (cronograma) handed in at the beginning of the course.

ERAMUS and other International Students are reminded that the academic calendar is the same for everyone and are therefore encouraged to join the course at the beginning of the semester. Late enrolment in the course is possible but not advisable as some of the continuous assignment activities (which amount to 40% of the total mark) will have already taken place and there will be no chance repeat those activities. They are also reminded that it is their responsibility to remain at the UIB until the assessment period is over (30 June).

Student learning assessment

ASSESSMENT

Students will have to pass BOTH partial exams (each of which is worth 30%) with a 5 to be able to obtain a pass in the subject. Students will also be asked to hand in a written portfolio (worth 40% of the mark) by the end of May. All the relevant information related to the portfolio tasks and deadlines will be available in Campus Extens. Details about the tasks to be completed for the portfolio will be provided throughout the course. The activities that form part of the student's portfolio cannot be repeated once the final version is handed in (No recuperable).

If the student obtains a pass mark in the portfolio but fails the exams, the pass mark will be kept (but not reflected in the grades record at UIB digital) until both exams are passed. In those cases where the mathematical average is higher than 5 but the conditions specified above are not met, the student will have 4.5 in his or her marks record in early June (periodo de evaluación complementaria) and the exam(s) will have to be repeated in late June (periodo de evaluación extraordinaria).

If a student fails to hand in an assignment or to show up on the day and at the time established by the lecturer for the exams, the grade for that assignment/exam/assessment session will be 0 (zero), in case the student has presented more than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks. Only if the student has presented 30% or less than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks, will the grade be 'NP'. The dates and times of the official exam will not be altered under any circumstances, except those contemplated in the Reglament Acadèmic (Articles 29 and 30). These rules apply also in the case of international or Erasmus Students who are reminded that it is their responsibility to remain at the UIB until the assessment period is over (30 June). Students will not be allowed into the classroom when the exam/assessment session has already started.

Plagiarism
