## Requirements

### Essential requirements

This subject will be a continuation of the contents and skills practised in English Language III. Therefore, students are supposed to have a good command of the grammatical points seen in the previous semester and they will be expected to have improved their grammatical correctness, their speaking fluency and writing accuracy. Failure to master the contents and skills of the previous level may lead to serious problems to pass the subject.

### Recommendable

Should students not have a good command of the grammatical points seen in the previous semester and they will be expected to have improve their linguistic compentence to keep up with the current level in English Language IV. The English Lab (Room C13) will surely come in handy.

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## Specific risks and protective measures

### Student learning assessment

#### Final Assessment Path A

All parts must be passed with a 5 for the students to get a pass in the subject, and all parts will count 20% towards the final mark. In order to pass the course the student must obtain a PASS grade (5 or higher) in all of the skills assessed. Consequently, should one or more parts not be successfully passed by the student, the rest of his/her grades will not be taken into account, even if the average score is a PASS (5 or higher). In this case, the student will have a 4.5 in his/her record (UIB Digital). The marks of the parts that the student has passed will be kept until the July exam of the same academic year.

#### Important information on examination dates:

If a student fails to hand in an assignment or to show up on the day and at the time established by the lecturer for the exams/practical sessions, the grade for that assignment/exam/practical session will be 0 (zero) in case the student has presented more than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks. Only if the student has presented 30% or less than 30% of the total assigned evaluation course tasks, will the grade be 'NP'. The dates and times of the official exams will not be altered under any circumstances, except those contemplated by the Reglament Acadèmic (when two exams coincide on the same day with a time difference of under three hours between them). Students will not be allowed into the classroom when the exam/practical session has already started. **Erasmus and/or international students will not have a flexible date to resit their asessment in June or July**. July assessments take place from 13 to 17 July. Dates will not be changed under any circumstances, except those contemplated by the Reglament Acadèmic when two exams coincide.

#### Final assessment (Itinerary B)

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Students who choose or have been assigned this option will complete the following tasks:

-One reading comprehension task (20% of the final mark), to be held on examination day.

- One composition (20% of the final mark), to be written on examination day

-One listening comprehension exercise (20% of the final mark), to be held on examination day.

Itinerary B students will also take a final exam. This will consist of two main parts of equal value: -Part I: Use of English (20% of the final mark).

-Part II (to be held on a separate date): Speaking (20% of the final mark).
